OLAB: Summer Business Camp at Wabash for High School Students

Opportunities to Learn About Business (OLAB) was founded 33 years ago by a group of Wabash College professors, Indiana business leaders, and the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce to show high school students that running a business can be fun, challenging, creative, and worthy of respect. OLAB, a week-long introduction to business and college life, is open to young men and women who will be high school seniors in Fall 2005. OLAB focuses on learning about the free enterprise system and participating in various simulated aspects of the rapidly changing business world. Teams play "The Game" based on teamwork and an intense schedule of lectures, computer and video simulations, and group projects. Participants live in dorms and have the unique opportunity of attending lectures and classes taught by Wabash professors and Indiana businessmen.

OLAB is free for those students who are accepted into the program – absolutely no cost except for transportation and personal expenses. Participants do not have to be Indiana residents or planning a career in business.
