I offered to write a short segment to explain a little about the new associate member education program. program is known as True Brother and was unveiled at the Stead Leadership Seminar in Memphis, TN this past summer. I was one of the five brothers that attended from our chapter and learned more about this program before we implemented it this year. Brother is a program that incorporates the ideals of our fraternity held dear since our founding, but organizes them into the seven-week associate member education program. This is an awesome program because it finally allows for associate member education to be similar across the nation. The program ties one of the seven core values into the education for the week. I will break down the core values briefly to explain True Brother a little more.

The seven core values are Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Service and Stewardship, Honor, Integrity, and Personal Courage. These make up the word LDRSHIP. Each week includes a story about the core value, which is addressed within the associate member meeting. This works in conjunction with the readings from the Paedagogus. Within week four, Service and Stewardship, local history is recommended. We still use the book "Yours, In ZAX", written by Brother

Mark Rutherford. Also, beyond the core values, the True Brother program provides a little more about each officer as the weeks progress, allowing the associates more opportunities to learn about the workings of the house before they become brothers. 
