Regarding the Play

Anon(ymous) is strongly relevant for our time and feels very current. In fact, it was written by Naomi Iizuka in 2007. The issues that Anon(ymous) seeks to discuss have continued and have become more divisive. The play resists easy categorization; its repetition, straightforward language, and creation for a young audience in Minneapolis's Children's Theatre Company belie its depth and intensity.

The playwright, Naomi lizuka, said in the script that this play was inspired by asking "What must it be like to come from a place like Sudan, for example, or Laos or Cambodia, and arrive in Minnesota? To leave your home and arrive in this snowy foreign land—what must that be like? What did they leave behind, and what were their lives like in this new place?" It provides questions about an issue where there are no simple answers. *Anon(ymous)* is inspired by Homer's epic, The Odyssey, borrowing its descriptions of home, journeying, identity, and being caught between contrasts. By taking one of the oldest written stories and using it to communicate about contemporary issues, *Anon(ymous)* provides a personal context for an issue that is often seen as national or global.

Refugee Life in the United States

"A refugee is someone who has been forced to flee his or her country because of persecution, war, or violence..."

- United Nations High Commission for Refugees

50,000 to 500,000 refugees flee their homes every year, often leaving everything they own to come to America. However, in the past year, that number has dropped to around 30,000 due to a number of different policy changes throughout the last decade. Once here, the vetting time for them is somewhere between eighteen and twenty-four months and is a rigorous process of interviews and background checks. To that end, there are a number of these refugees that remain undocumented, choosing to stay in the country that rejected their asylum claim instead of returning to their war-torn homelands.

Sweatshop Labor

The US Department of Labor defines a sweatshop as a factory that violates two or more labor laws, pertaining to wages, benefits, working hours, and child labor. Most factories meeting this definition are located in Los Angeles, San Diego, and nearby; where 93% of so classified cases violated multiple labor laws.

The world consumes about 80 billion new pieces of clothing every year and Americans generate 82 pounds of textile waste while we are continuously bombarded by cheaply sold clothes and marketing campaign to buy more. "Over 45,000 workers cut, sew and finish garments locally, a workforce comprised primarily of Latino/a and Asian immigrants."

The Garment Workers Center in L.A reports that

workers face harsh realities, saying that, "approximately 60% [of workers] are denied minimum wage and 93% are denied overtime wages." These factories are often sweltering due to poor ventilation and industrial steam presses. They lack filters to reduce fabric fibers in the air, placing workers at risk for serious respiratory illnesses. The workers frequently do not have access to drinking water and clean bathrooms. Punctures wounds from sewing machine needles or tag guns are prevalent and yet employers typically do not provide first aid kits. Finally, workers endure repetitive motion injuries to their wrists, shoulders and back, and eye strain due to poor lighting."
