Results are "negative", meaning no detectable levels of cancer cell DNA (specific to my particular urothelial metastatic cancer) in my blood. I understand that the likely procedure is that I will be able to discontinue my cancer meds (and the side effects also!!!) and likely monitor with scans every 3 months, and a repeat of the Signatera annually. ## From Ted Klopp -

Harvest is over! It was early this year. My daughter has told me that she doesn't want to see me out there during harvest as we usually start about 12am as it is cooler for the guys and the grapes and arrive cool at the winery. As my balance is off a bit, I could be a hazard to myself and others, in the dark, so I get them going, then adjourn to the house. (They know

what they are doing.) I am both retired and working. Being a farmer never quits. The plants don't stop growing! Kathy and I designed and supervised the remodeling of a smaller house on another of our properties and have recently moved it. My daughter and her family will move into the house we just vacated. Divesting ourselves of 40 years of stuff and moving from a larger house to a smaller house is/was a huge task. My wife and some of her girlfriends did most of the work. Many full boxes were donated to charity so hopefully the items will find new welcoming homes. We hope to take off in our sprinter rv for a couple of weeks before the rain arrives and it gets cold. Hope you are doing well. Thanks for your updates.

And from me - we finally completed construction of our new house in coastal North Carolina. We sold the rescue farm we had for the prior ten years and rehomed our last two horses and two miniature donkeys. We had also become more involved in supporting a local dog rescue and decided to keep doing that, but at a different level. Since we were moving about 120 miles from the rescue, it didn't work for fostering individual dogs for local adoption. So we shifted gears and started fostering mama dogs with new litters. We pick them up from the rescue, drive them back to our house where we keep them until the puppies are weaned and ready for adoption. Then we take them back to the rescue where they are advertised for adoption. Our biggest challenge was a mama with eleven puppies – while we were still in a rental house. Happily we had a dog-loving landlord who allowed us to keep the extra animals in the garage. He even put an extra window in the garage to allow for more natural light. Since then we have had two other sets of mamas with six puppies each. Our total for fostering has reached 186 dogs – and all have found new homes. We have a mama and six more pups now in the shed we added to our new house..

As we moved into the new house, we have been sorting through boxes of stuff that have been in storage. I found a couple of interesting things in one box. It was the salary schedule for my first job after Wabash. It was a position at the National Security Agency (where I worked for 47 years) and the starting salary was \$4,341. That wouldn't go very far today.
