#### A MESSAGE FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF STUDENTS' - WABASH CULTURE

According to our students, two characteristics, among many, make Wabash a truly distinctive college: the level of confidence we place in our students and the responsibility we give to them. The College's only rule, the Gentleman's Rule, symbolizes this distinction:

"The student is expected to conduct himself at all times, both on and off campus, as a Gentleman and a Responsible Citizen."

We expect our students to act as gentlemen and responsible citizens and to participate daily in defining what our community means by these terms. We expect them to make many important decisions about their academic, residential, personal, and social lives at Wabash. Most students make good decisions most of the time. Occasionally a few students make poor ones. Our students learn from both kinds of decisions, and we hope to guide them to increase the good ones and limit the poor ones.

We believe that students learn best when given responsibility and freedom for making those decisions. Therefore, Wabash will work directly with your son regarding the decisions he makes. The small size of the Student Life staff requires that students assume responsibility for managing much of their daily lives. Federal privacy laws restrict our ability to communicate most matters directly with you.

All of us at Wabash look forward to working with your son in the coming year. Thank you in advance for the opportunity we have to support your son in his collegiate pursuits.

#### RULE OF CONDUCT AND ACADEMIC HONESTY

Perhaps the most striking aspect of student life at Wabash is personal freedom. Believing that students ought to develop self-reliance and personal responsibility, the College has long prescribed only one rule of conduct:

The student is expected to conduct himself, at all times, both on and off the campus, as a gentleman and a responsible citizen.

Adherence to this code of conduct is primarily a student's responsibility. Enforcement of the rule lies with the Dean of Students Office.

As an intellectual community, Wabash requires the highest standards of <u>academic honesty</u>. Cases of academic dishonesty are managed by the Dean of the College's Office. The Associate Dean of the College receives faculty reports of cases of academic dishonesty and meets with all students accused. The Dean of the College adjudicates cases of academic dishonesty requiring an administrative response and makes decisions about continuation at the College.

#### SENDING YOUR STUDENT MAIL

Fraternity mail is delivered directly to the fraternity house by the US Postal Service. Independent men are assigned mailboxes in random order. Student mailbox numbers and combinations are emailed to them, and they will keep the same mailbox throughout their time at Wabash.

#### ACADEMIC CENTERS FOR EXCELLENCE

#### STUDENT ENGAGEMENT & SUCCESS

The Student Engagement & Success office provides support for all Wabash students with a focus on first- and second-year students, first-generation college students, and students of color. Services include Wabash Interaction Network, alumni mentoring, and peer mentoring.

#### HEALTH SERVICES, MEDICAL EMERGENCIES, & INSURANCE

All students will be required to have health insurance this year. A front and back copy of the student's insurance card is required for the Student Health Center. In addition, ALL STUDENTS are required to provide the Student Health Center with their current address, emergency contact, insurance information, medical alerts, and health history information. To expedite this process Wabash College uses an online data entry system - <a href="https://www.wabash.studenthealthportal.com">www.wabash.studenthealthportal.com</a>.

It is important to check with your son's insurance carrier to see if physicians in Crawfordsville and the greater Indianapolis area are considered in-network.

#### HEALTH INSURANCE FOR STUDENT ATHLETES

NCAA Athletes need Primary Medical Insurance that covers you **OUT OF STATE** and **UP TO \$90,000** and covers intercollegiate sports injuries. HMOs and Medicaid will not do this. The athletic accident insurance at Wabash College provides secondary coverage for students for injuries while participating in the practice or competition of intercollegiate sports. <u>Your policy must be used as PRIMARY COVERAGE</u>. Wabash College is the secondary coverage with a deductible.

#### COUNSELING CENTER

The Counseling Center assists students and their dependents with objective, professional assistance for a broad range of issues. As well as helping them manage the stress of college life and to promote healthy and effective life choices.

Student contact with the Counseling Center is confidential between the student and the counselor to the fullest extent of the law (FERPA). Some examples of when information has to be released include when there is an imminent danger to someone or a report of current abuse of a child or elder. Other releases of information, except to a treating professional, can also affect the privacy of information, students must be sure to ask and understand when seeking services.

#### MENTAL HEALTH EMERGENCIES

Where imminent danger exists, the student should call 911 before contacting the counseling staff. Wabash Security can be reached at 765.361.6000.

#### WABASH STUDENT HEALTH PORTAL

Wabash uses an electronic records system called PyraMED. This program enables the College to streamline the collection of medical information to be used by the Student Health Center staff and athletic trainers. It will also be used by Dean Thrush to evaluate academic and physical accommodations for students. More information about PyraMed.

Since the Portal allows access to sensitive protected health information including Student Health Center clinical notes, labs, and other test results, it is critical that students do not share their network logon credentials with anyone, including their parents unless they want them to have full access.

#### **EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM**

The WABASH ALERT <u>Emergency Notification System</u> communicates through email, webpage alerts and/or text messaging. These communications inform you of an emergency situation and may direct you to take certain actions. These alerts are usually in the earliest moments of a crisis or emergency and may contain brief, concise, information and directions. #### VEHICLES & PARKING

All Wabash students may have vehicles on campus. Parking permits are not required but are encouraged for vehicle identification purposes. Students can request a parking pass <u>online</u> or by visiting campus security. City of Crawfordville parking ordinances are enforced on campus.

#### Housing

Wabash students choose from a wide range of housing options — eight independent residence halls or ten national fraternities. Students are required to live in campus housing for all four years.

All the College-owned chapter houses were built new or renovated in the last 20 years and all are located on campus. All the fraternities are focused on the ideals of scholarship, brotherhood, and service. Students who choose to remain independent live in one of eight residence halls. Living accommodations in these buildings vary from single-man rooms to doubles, triples, and quads. All of them have common social areas and laundry facilities.

Residence Halls and Townhomes — College Hall, Martindale Hall, Morris Hall, Rogge Hall, Williams Hall, Wolcott Hall, Butler Townhome, and Seymour Townhome.

#### **DINING**

Each fraternity has its own meal plan, dining room, and cook.

Men who live in residence halls eat in the **Sparks Center** and have a choice of meal plans (19 or 15 meals per week). Wabash contracts with <u>Café Bon Appetit</u> to provide high-quality meals to the campus community.

Scarlet Inn located on the lower level of Sparks Center, offers a specialty grilled sandwich menu.

<u>Wally's Pub</u> located on the main level of Sparks Center features five gourmet pizzas, a range of low-cost appetizers, and weekly sandwich specials.

1832 Brew located on the main level of Lilly Library serves coffee, tea, and blended beverages at a low price and a tasty assortment of pastries.

#### LAUNDRY FACILITIES

All residence halls and fraternity houses have washers and dryers. Laundry facilities are free to students for the 2024-2025 school year. Students are responsible for supplying detergent, etc. There are also several laundromats and dry-cleaning establishments in Crawfordsville.

#### CAMPUS BOOKSTORE

The Wabash College Bookstore sells office supplies, course materials, and clothing.

#### CAREER SERVICES

Career Services helps students identify and execute plans to become productive, fulfilled men after Wabash. Whatever he can dream of, we offer individualized programs and resources to help him get there, from employment to graduate school to teaching in Africa.

We are continuously creating new opportunities for students to enrich their academic learning with hands-on experiences such as industry seminars, resume and cover letter writing workshops, career fairs, graduate school preparation, job and internship readiness, career interest inventories, and support guidance for alternative paths such as fellowships and gap years.

The internship experience has become increasingly necessary for success for new graduates. We provide internship support as well as funding for internship opportunities, including our Small Business Internship Fund. We can also assist students with connecting to other college-funded opportunities to complete internships or independent research projects in politics, law, business, and more. Other Wabash-funded opportunities for professional development include our Professional Immersion Experience (PIE) trips to New York, Colorado, California, and externships.

Career Services also offers students opportunities to network with alumni on campus as well as in Chicago, Indianapolis, New York City, and Washington D.C.

All Wabash students have access to the "Suit Yourself" program, which allows them to borrow (for free) donated professional clothing items from our Suit Room for interviews, campus events, or whatever else they would like.

Career Services hosts a multitude of events throughout the school year, and parents can stay in the loop by visiting our website and the Wabash calendar, as well as following us on our social media sites. We also have many opportunities for families to get involved in the success of Wabash students, such as hosting externships, internships, hosting students, or introducing us to your professional or graduate school contacts.

#### REGISTRAR'S OFFICE

The Registrar's Office is committed to maintaining the integrity, accuracy, and confidentiality of academic records, continuously improving our processes and services, and supporting Wabash College's mission and its lifelong relationship with students and alumni. Services include FERPA compliance, academic calendars, academic records, contact information (current students and parents), registration and course schedule changes, final exam schedule, transcript processing; and enrollment verification.

#### FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS & PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

FERPA is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA permits Wabash to release, without consent, certain directory information, including the Wabash student's name, local, home, and cell phone number, email address, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, class standing, weight and height of members of athletic teams, honors, awards, and scholarships earned, photographs, dates of attendance, degree received, post-graduate plans and most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. A Wabash student may request that directory information not be released without prior written consent by filing a written statement with the Wabash Registrar two weeks before enrollment.

#### ACADEMIC CALENDAR

The <u>Four-Year Calendar</u> lists all the important dates for the next four years including the start of classes, breaks, and final exams.

#### PERSONAL/ FAMILY CONTACT INFORMATION

Maintaining accurate contact information for both (all) parents and our students is crucial. Please ensure that your son notifies the <u>Registrar's Office</u> of any changes in address, phone numbers, and email addresses.

#### REGISTRATION

Freshmen register for their Freshman Tutorial any time between April 15 – June 1 using the New Student Road Map. Pre-registration for the fall semester for freshmen occurs during Orientation. For returning students pre-register for fall classes in April and in November for spring classes. Students must be in good standing with the Business Office to pre-register for classes.

#### COURSE SCHEDULE CHANGES

Dates to add and drop classes are posted on the Four-Year Calendar and in the Registrar's Office. It is the student's responsibility to know and meet these deadlines.

#### NORMAL COURSE LOAD

The curriculum is limited to full-credit and half-credit courses. The usual student course load is four, four, and one-half, or five-course credits per semester. Freshmen are advised to take no more than four credits in their first semester.

#### TRANSCRIPTS

Transcripts must be requested by the student through <u>Student Self Services</u>. There is a small processing fee and transcripts will be released only if the student is in good standing with the Business Office.

#### ENROLLMENT & DEGREE VERIFICATION

Enrollment verification is used to verify a student's full-time enrollment and good standing for loan deferments, insurance, scholarships, and other purposes. Students can gain access to their Enrollment Verification and Good Student Discount forms through Student Self Services.

#### ID CARDS

ID cards are issued to all entering students during orientation. The card is valid for all four years. The ID serves as a library card, may be used to charge photocopies in the library, and is used for admission into the dining hall and athletic events. There is a fee to replace lost ID cards.

Wabash IT Services supports all technology on campus, including instructional technology, enterprise computing, network infrastructure, computer labs and classrooms, help desk, web technologies, research computing, and telecommunications.


